




What is EDEN?

Extension Disaster Education Network

A collaborative multi-state effort by Cooperate Extension Services across the country to improve the delivery of services to citizens affected by disaster. Over 300 delegates representing 77 Extension systems.



Florida EDEN



Collaborative effort across Extension offices in all 67 counties

- 3 Points of Contact (POC)
 - 1 overall (Lindsey)
 - 1 from FAMU (Davis)
 - 1 representing FL Sea Grant (Patterson)
- Over 20 delegates with representatives from all over the state

Our Work

- Align with national mission to reduce the impact of disasters through research-based education
- Work with all 67 counties on programs, education, & tools involved at all levels of disaster management - preparedness, mitigation, response, & recovery

Role of Extension in Disasters

- At each level of hazard 4-Phase Model
 - Mitigation
 - Preparedness
 - Response
 - Recovery
- First Responders
- "Information First Responders"
- Long-term recovery

Work in Mitigation & Preparation

Year-long programs in communities for preparedness Development of materials that can be distributed post storm Works with partners to gather supplies to have ready to take to impacted areas Development of education pieces needed to help communities prepare

Working with local, state, & federal partners

Work in Response

- Serve in their county Emergency Operations Centers (EOCs) before, during, & after disasters
- Work in shelters
- Work with partners to provide water, ready-toeat perishable meals, ice, feed, and hard-toget resources
- Work with state emergency management teams
- Agents in impacted areas visit farms & other sites to assess damages and help with cleanup
 - Dr. Christa Court has developed a survey instrument to assess damages quickly to determine the economic impacts of disasters






Work in Recovery

- Provided information on federal, state, & local assistance programs
- Provided industry stakeholder resources, donation & pick-up locations, recovery centers
- Faculty & staff arranged clean-ups of gardens & landscapes





Work in Recovery


- Pushed information from partners, local, state, & federal agencies to Extension offices for distribution within communities:






4 Response Phases






Community Resilience

- Identifying communities in most economically impacted areas
- Using PhotoVoice Methodology to determine mental health needs and gaps while these communities work through recovery
- Community members provide photos of what recovery looks like
- Utilizing our partnerships (linking capital) to meet those needs/gaps through outreach efforts
